75th RAS and 122nd National Audubon Society Christmas Bird Count Summary

Date: 12/19/2021

Despite a second year of COVID-19 restrictions our dedicated field and feeder counters came through with another rousing success! A giant **THANK YOU** to all participants!!




Figure 1. Weather conditions for December 19, 2021 RAS CBC: Air temperature, dew point, and maximum wind gusts.

Weather: Weather conditions prior to the RAS 75th annual CBC had been unseasonably warm (50-60°F) but by Count Day began to cool off. During daylight birding hours, it was partly sunny with temperatures ranging from 34 to 37°F (**Figure 1**). Dew Point temperatures ranged from 21 to 30°F. Sustained winds ranged from 2 to 5 mph. Wind gusts ranged from 7 to 16 mph from the WNW throughout the day. With wind chill, daytime temperatures felt like 31 to 35°F.

Temperatures during nocturnal birding hours (from the earliest start time, 4:00 AM, to sunrise, 7:16 AM) ranged from 37 to 40°F with dew point temperatures ranging from 30 to 37°F. Sustained winds during the period were 2-4 mph. Wind gusts ranged from 8-17 mph from the WNW.

Prior to Count Week (Dec 16-22), air temperatures were relatively mild from December 1 through December 15 with the average daily high air temperature ranging from 35 to 64°F and the daily low air temperature ranging from 28 to 39°F. There were no snowfall events prior to or following Count Week and all waterways were entirely ice free up until and during Count Day.

Coverage: The sixteen (16) teams spent a total of 80 team hours covering 69 miles by foot during their daylight birding effort. These teams also spent an additional 14 team hours covering 206 miles by car during daylight hours. An additional 7.5 hours were spent on nighttime birding (owling). Despite the challenges of COVID-19, the number of count participants, 39, is slightly above the 1977- 2021 median of 35.

Results: Rockland Audubon Society conducted its 75th annual Christmas Bird Count on Sunday, December 19, 2021. Thirty-nine (39) individuals (plus fledgling counter Phoebe Fuller) participated in the field count, tallying 17,254 birds of 84 different species. Four feeder counters (at four locations) added 103 birds of 15 species. Combining both field and feeder counts,17,357 individuals representing 84 species were tallied. Eight additional species were added during Count Week bringing the total number of species detected to 92.

The number of species observed was relatively high by historic standards. The 84 count day species marks the 81st percentile of all RAS count years (1947-2021) and the 68th percentile of all modern RAS circle boundary years (1978-2021). The number of individuals is, however, low. It is just above the median count (53rd percentile) for 1947-2021 and only the 23rd percentile for 1978-2021. The ten most abundant species for 2021, in descending order, were: **Red-winged Blackbird, European Starling, Canada Goose, Common Merganser, Ring-billed Gull, Mallard, Common Grackle, White-throated Sparrow, American Robin,** and **Dark-eyed Junco**. Together, they comprised nearly 80% of the total individuals. Twenty-nine (29) species made up 95% of the total number of birds counted.

New High Counts:

New high counts were established for:

Greater White-fronted Goose – one seen, tied with single occurrences in 1999 and 2006 Mute Swan (205 v 159 in 2020)
Ring-necked Duck (193 v 60 in 1965) – see Photo #7
Double-crested Cormorant (112 v 40 in 2001) – all but 1 from Piermont Pier, Team 1
Turkey Vulture (178 v 143 in 2019)
Bald Eagle (78 v 53 in 2020)
Northern Flicker (40 v 34 in 1984).
Yellow-bellied Sapsucker (14 v 13 in 2017)
Common Raven (24 v 19 in 2019)

Some Highlights:

Greater White-fronted Goose – On the morning of December 3, Douglas Morel, a local birder, found a Greater White-fronted Goose floating among approximately 40 Canada Geese on Rockland Lake near Parking Lots 4 and 5. He posted his sighting on eBird that day. Subsequently, the bird was typically easily seen and documented most days from 12/3 to at least 12/25. This species is very rare in Rockland County, having been reported (to the best of my knowledge) only three times from 1884 through the present. Robert Deed, in his compendium of Rockland avian sightings from 1844 through 1983, cites only a single report – 4 individuals on an ice floe on the Hudson River during February 1970. More recently, the Rockland Audubon Society Christmas Bird Count (RAS CBC) notes only two occurrences, one in 1999 in the East Orangetown District, and a second in 2006 in the South Ramapo District.

December 16 was the first day of the 2021 RAS CBC Count Week. To make sure that this continuing rarity made it onto our 2021 CBC, if only as a Count Week observation, Alan & Della Wells drove to Parking Lot 1 where they easily found the bird. A couple of quick photos (**Photo 1**) for documentation ensured at least a Count Week record for the RAS CBC. Turned out Matt Papula and Ari Weiss also found it on December 19, thereby ultimately giving us an official RAS CBC Count Day record!

Black-crowned Night-Heron – A single Black-crowned Night-Heron was found by Stephanie and Michael Garber, Suzanne Barclay, and Veronika Krause in the South Clarkstown District. The bird was spotted on the stream emanating below the dam at Lake DeForest. This species has been found in only seven previous RAS Christmas Counts.

Snowy Owl – On December 14, two days prior to the start of the RAS CBC Count Week, I received a call from Ari Weiss that a Snowy Owl had been found at Piermont Pier. When Della and I arrived, we discovered that there were in fact two Snowy Owls, one along the breakwater on the north side of the Pier and another at the end of the Pier. The occurrence of even one, let alone two, Snowy Owls in Rockland County is a very rare event; Robert Deed cited only 11 records during the period 1844 through 1983 with six of those sightings from the Harriman–Bear Mountain State Park and the Ramapo area. More recently, a Snowy Owl was seen sporadically from Jan 4 through Apr 8, 2007 at Piermont Pier. Another Snowy Owl was seen on Feb 23, 2014 at Piermont Pier. Only once, in 1971, did the species occur on the RAS CBC.

The two Snowy Owls on 12/14/21 were seen by numerous observers, but by the next day, both seemed to have disappeared. Ari Weiss re-located one of the owls on 12/16 (the first Count Week day) at the end of the Pier only to have it disappear again. Despite the extensive effort by our CBC Team, neither owl could be re-located on Count Day. On 12/20 a local birder sighted one of the owls, but there have been no subsequent sightings of either owl.

Misses

Missed birds are those birds "typically" seen but not found during the current year. A "MISS" is defined as any species not found on Count Day but (1) found in 50% or more of the RAS CBC counts since 1947 or (2) 50% or more of the RAS CBC counts in the previous 10 years.

Ruffed Grouse and **Ring-necked Pheasant** were again missed this year. Both have been seen in 40 previous counts. Ring-necked Pheasant has not seen since 1995 and are now probably extirpated from the county. Any recent sightings are likely released or escaped farm-raised game birds. Ruffed Grouse has not been seen on the count since 2001.

Field Sparrow – Seen in 59 (80%) previous counts since 1947 and five (50%) out of the last 10 counts; last seen in 2020.

Savannah Sparrow – Seen in 34 (46%) previous counts since 1947 and five (50%) out of the 10 counts, last seen in 2019.

Brown-headed Cowbird – Seen in 52 (70%) previous counts since 1947 and six out of the last 10 counts; the species was last seen in the 2019 RAS CBC.




Figure 2. Number of species and individuals by year reported for Rockland Audubon CBC.

Photo 7. During early December for many years, a dozen or so Ring-neck Ducks inhabit a small pond just at the northern edge of the Count Circle in Tomkins Cove. Invariably the pond ices over before the CBC and the ducks all leave. This year, an extraordinarily large number (177) of Ring-necks Ducks arrived, and without freeze-up, they stayed throughout the entire CBC period. This resulted in a record shattering high count, 193 versus 60 seen in 1965. This group of predominately males was photographed on December 20, 2021 by Alan Wells.


